A Resolution Establishing its firm support for increased tribal enrollment at Bacone College and increased levels of funding

Resolution No. 14 - 16



WHEREAS, the Inter-Tribal Council of the Five Civilized Tribes (ITC) is an organization that unites the Tribal Governments of the Cherokee, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Muscogee (Creek), and Seminole Nations, representing over 500,000 Indian people throughout the United States; and,



WHEREAS, Bacone College was established in Muskogee, Indian Territory with a grant of 160 acres by the Muscogee (Creek) Nation; and,



WHEREAS, the original mission of Bacone College was to be "to the Indian Territory, as nearly as practicable, all that state universities are to the several states in which they are located..."; and,

WHEREAS, higher education is an important function of sovereign governments across the world; and,



WHEREAS, Bacone College's mission to serving Native Americans is unique among private colleges; and,

WHEREAS, the Tribal Governments of the Cherokee, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Muscogee (Creek), and Seminole Nations support partnerships in higher education that benefit their citizens; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Inter-Tribal Council of the Five Civilized Tribes establishes its firm support for increased tribal enrollment at Bacone College and increased levels of funding for Bacone College; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, to take an interest in, advise, and counsel Bacone College in better serving tribal communities.
