



WHEREAS, Congress passed the Indian Child Welfare Act in 1978 to combat the widespread abuse of the child welfare system through the wholesale removal of Indian children from their homes and communities; and

WHEREAS, there is a long and shameful history in the United States of non-Indians seeking to remove Indian children from their families and their tribes by asserting that Indian people do not know what is best for Indian children; and

WHEREAS, all Indian children deserve an opportunity to grow up knowing their family history, participating in their culture and communities, and speaking the language of their tribe; and

WHEREAS, Indian people, represented by their tribal governments, are in the best position to determine what is in the best interest of Indian children; and

WHEREAS, the Indian Child Welfare Act gives Indian tribes and relatives a greater voice in the placement and care of Indian children; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that ITC calls on all Indian tribes, national and regional organizations to support the efforts of the United States Department of Justice and the Bureau of Indian Affairs ("BIA") in their defense of the Indian Child Welfare Act and the BIA's Guidelines for State Courts on implementing the Indian Child Welfare Act's provisions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that ITC calls upon Congress, its authorizing committees, and the House Native American Caucus to exercise appropriate oversight on implementation of the Indian Child Welfare Act, and to use all of the tools available to them, including hearings, briefings, and Dear Colleague letters to educate their colleagues on the effectiveness of the Indian Child Welfare Act.
